




Number of Mares bred by Stallion




The industry impact of stallions that bred large numbers of mares is a common concern. In 2009, stallions that bred 100 or more mares accounted for 2/10ths of a percent (.2%) of the total number of stallions. The group with the greatest impact, by far was stallions that bred two to four mares, accounting for 37.2 percent of breeding stallions. Stallions that bred no more than 24 mares accounted for 97.8 percent of all breeding stallions. Only 5 percent of total mares bred were crossed with stallions that bred 100 or more mares. Of the mares bred last year, 89.3 percent were bred to a stallion that bred 49 or fewer mares.

Stallions used for Breeding

These charts illustrate mares bred to stallions broken down by general performance category. Race stallions were categorized as stallions that have started a race or sired a starter. Horses that have earned at least one AQHA point or have an offspring that has earned at least one AQHA point are considered show stallions. The remaining stallions were put into the "other activity" group.




Number of Mares bred to Stallion groups





Number of Mares bred to Stallion groups



Number of Mares bred to Stallion groups






Average Number of Mares Bred per Stallion




